Testing & Education Reference Center (TERC) is a start-to-finish resource with all the information and support materials needed to complete high school, prepare for college, obtain an advanced degree, and make informed career choices.

TERC has expanded to include a variety of new materials over the past few years. For example, in addition to more than 300 practice tests, there are Online Courses for the major tests for entering college, such as the PSAT,

SAT, and ACT. These courses are personalized based on the results of a diagnostic pretest.

The Family College Planning Center guides students and families through the years from 9th grade to college. It lays out what students need to accomplish each quarter or month of the year in order to reach their destination - college.

Scholarship Search has acquired some new tools: The "Award Analyzer" helps students compare financial awards from different schools and suggests the award package that provides the smallest unmet need, and the "College Savings Calculator" estimates the amount of money a family must save for college.

Build a Resume (i.e. "Resume Builder") is a valuable tool for anyone who is seeking employment or wants to improve their college applications. There are 14 web page resumes available, suggestions of phrases and "hot" verbs to incorporate, and resume writing strategies.






